Research Design

- ✓ Telephone survey of 501 adult registered Colorado voters from September 19-23, 2008 was conducted by Ciruli Associates for the Economic Development Council of Colorado (EDCC). Respondents were selected from a random sample of Colorado registered voters who regularly vote in presidential year elections. Voters were then screened to determine likelihood to vote. This is the third-annual survey for the organization on economic development and government topics.
- ✓ The questionnaire was developed with input from the EDCC and a review of the 2006 and 2007 economic development surveys. Question wording was pre-tested and adjusted to enhance clarity, validity and reliability. The order of questions was rotated to reduce question-order bias in question series with the same response categories.
- Telephone interviews were conducted by a professional, supervised interviewing service. Pretesting was conducted to enhance clarity and reliability. A multiple callback procedure was employed to increase likelihood of reaching eligible registered voters. Calls were made at different times of day and included weekdays and weekends to increase response. Each interview required an average of 20 minutes to complete. Interviews were conducted in Spanish and on cell phone, when needed.
- ✓ Statistical range of accuracy in 19 out of 20 cases is plus or minus 4.4 percentage points for a sample size of 501, meaning that 95 percent of the time if all voters with telephones in Colorado had been surveyed, the findings would differ from the survey results by no more than plus or minus 4.4 percentage points. Sample tolerances for subgroups are larger. For example, the confidence interval for a subgroup of 300 respondents is ±5.7 percentage points. Due to rounding, not all totals equal 100 percent. The number of respondents is indicated in questions involving less than the entire sample of 501. Survey results can be affected by other factors, such as question wording and order.

Referendum O is a constitutional 55. amendment that decreases the number of signatures required to place a statutory initiative on the ballot, and increases the number of signatures required to place a constitutional initiative on the ballot. It requires that eight percent of signatures for constitutional initiatives be gathered from each congressional district and that drafts of proposed constitutional initiatives be submitted for review earlier in the year. It extends the time period for collecting signatures for statutory initiatives, increases the number of votes required for the legislature to change a statutory initiative for five years after the statute takes effect, and allows the public and state legislators to comment on initiatives at a public meeting. 

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Presidential Race Deadlocked in Colorado Prior to Debate; Udall has 7-Point Lead in U.S. Senate Race

In the latest Ciruli Associates statewide voter poll, conducted just prior to the September 26 presidential debate, the race in Colorado was deadlocked at 44 percent for Senator Barack Obama and 43 percent for Senator John McCain.

A 2-point McCain lead in Colorado after the Republican National Convention has dissipated, and now Obama is up in Colorado polls. In recent Colorado polls, Obama is leading by 1 to 4 percentage points.



The Third-Annual Citizens Poll (Sept. 19-23, 2008) was sponsored by the Economic Development Council of Colorado (EDCC), a statewide consortium of local and regional economic development professionals. The statewide survey was conducted with 501 Colorado voters, and has a statistical

range of error of ± 4.4 percentage points.

Senate Election

Mark Udall has a seven-point lead in the U.S. Senate race over Bob Schaffer, 45 percent to 38 percent.

Recent polls have shown a Udall lead of 2 to 8 percent.



Approval Ratings: Ritter and Bush

Although Governor Bill Ritter's approval has dropped since it was first tested in 2007, it is still in the high fifties (58%), and near Governor Bill Owens' approval rating of 60 percent in September 2006 at the end of his term. President George W. Bush's approval continues to decline.

Research Design

The 501 respondents of the telephone survey were selected from a random sample of Colorado registered voters who regularly vote in presidential-year elections. Voters were then screened to determine their likelihood to vote. This is the third-annual survey for the EDCC on economic development and government issues. Statistical range of accuracy in 19 out of 20 cases is plus or minus 4.4 percentage points for a sample size of 501 – meaning that 95 percent of the time if all voters with telephones in Colorado had been surveyed, the findings would differ from the survey results by no more than plus or minus 4.4 percentage points. Survey results can be affected by other factors, such as question wording and order.
